

Unofficial Summer A & C 2018 figures were captured May 15th (on the 1st day of classes) and reflect an unduplicated headcount. Each student is counted once, even if concurrently enrolled in both an undergraduate and graduate program or in other summer sessions.

As compared to last year, Daytona Beach undergraduate enrollment has decreased .5% (from 1383 to 1376) and graduate enrollment has remained constant (from 79 to 79). Prescott undergraduate enrollment has decreased 5.1% (from 501 to 475) and graduate enrollment has decreased 15.3% (from 13 to 11).

As compared to last year, Daytona Beach undergraduate enrollment has increased 16.6% (from 1019 to 1228) and graduate enrollment has increased 30.8% (from 121 to 175). Prescott undergraduate enrollment has increased 17.6% (from 383 to 465) and graduate enrollment has increased 66.6% (from 2 to 6).

The decrease in Summer A and increase in Summer C enrollments is impacted by the strategic initiative to encourage students to consider WW online course offerings over the summer (which are recorded in the Summer C term).

NOTE: ERLI students are excluded from all counts. Exchange, escrow, and readmitted students are included, but are categorized as continuing, not new. New students are comprised of First-time, Transfer, and Non-degree students who are enrolled for the first time this term. Students in an accelerated program (typically taking both UG and GR coursework concurrently) who have not yet finished their BS degree requirements are included in the continuing undergraduate count, but will appear in a future graduate student count upon conferral of the BS degree.
